Workshop 1 Summary: Young People



"Wisdom comes with experience, not age."

Key Messages:

- Equity is an issue we need to think about all care leavers from London. Or indeed, all care leavers in London.
- Broaden Corporate Parenting Boards to include our partners.
- How do we deal with the exploiters? So much focus on the child, we need a whole system approach to exploiters.
- Can we create a child-friendly London? A mechanism to draw partners in. A framework to amplify childhood.
- Great to see a pan-London offer, we need to keep building this!

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Workshop 2 Summary: Resources & Commissioning



"Risk sharing and a brave redirection of resources are critical."

Key Messages:

- Address children's needs earlier through brave re-direction of resources to improve value for money and deliver better outcomes
- Risk sharing and political ownership are key to success, across local authorities and with partners
- Strong relationships with shared understanding and language is the foundation for success
- Strengthen understanding through data sharing, aligned commissioning cycles and joint outcomes
- Market development and new local authority/partner provision across London to address gaps

Workshop 3 Summary: Workforce



"Nothing happens without our workforce."

 Cllr Ian Edwards – Leader London Borough of Hillingdon and London Councils Executive Lead for Schools and Children's Services

Key Messages:

- Young people coming into the workforce are not looking for the same things that previous generations did, we must be creative in attracting and retaining talent.
- Can we develop a collaborative 'London Offer' that goes further, a 'Workforce Compact' for staff?
- Our reliance on agency staff is a symptom and not a cause. We must address the root cause issues together.
 Children need a permanent and stable workforce.
- Racism is real. We must walk the difficult path, be authentic, credible and intentional about inclusion and equity. 'Not shoes for all, but shoes that fit for all'.
- How do we use London's collective buying power to address housing and travel pressures for our workforce?
 We want people to work in London, but we also want them to stay.
- Can we achieve true consistency? Our different structures, job titles, pay and benefits for permanent staff weakens recruiting power and incites competition between us.
- Great to see London's voice influencing national progress, how do we keep doing this across other priorities?
