Dear Colleagues,

Our SEND Team is expanding following additional DfE funding, and in anticipation of a busy year as we look forward to the issue of the Schools' White Paper. This Bulletin introduces key new managers in: Inclusion and Universal Support; Innovation and Targeted Support; and SEND Resources and Commissioning as well as other new key posts, all seen as priority areas as we work with you to improve value for money and outcomes for children with SEND.

I'm pleased that we're also running a fourth cohort of the London SEND Leadership Programme, building on the success highlighted in evaluations to date.

There's also an important opportunity to highlight and share good practice in inclusion of children with SEND in London, which we expect to be a key focus of the White Paper.

ALDCS SEND PLAN - 25/26

The ALDCS SEND Plan 2025/26 builds on strong foundations to improve SEND and AP outcomes across London LAs through enhanced data, diagnostics, collaboration, and support. It focuses on four key strands:

DATA CAPACITY & CAPABILITY

Aims to strengthen and support London's capacity to use high-quality data to build a clearer picture of needs and provisions, which enables more informed decision-making and continuous improvement.

Key activities include developing London-focused quarterly and annual benchmarking data collections, creating the 'Making Data Speak for London's Children' programme, supporting multiagency data sharing projects, and engaging with national and regional networks to promote strong data practice.

SEND REGIONAL DIAGNOSTICS

Aims to support and identify systemic and local challenges to inform targeted interventions and shared learning across London.

Key activities include enhancing diagnostic approaches with qualitative research and SEND enablers, delivering regional diagnostics through data and Practice Spotlight, expanding stakeholder networks and communities of practice, maintaining strong communications across newsletters and events, and aligning regional diagnostics with SEND Targeted Support and national bodies.

SEND INNOVATION & TARGETED SUPPORT

Aims to support and accelerate progress in LAs through bespoke, evidence-informed support offers.

Key activities include developing a SEND Targeted Support model for London, creating criteria for targeted support packages informed by diagnostics, delivering a second phase of Practice Spotlight focused on SEND reform readiness, delivering thematic peer reviews, analysing examples of strong local practice, coordinating with DfE, LGA, and NHSE, and exploring opportunities for AI innovation in SEND services

UNIVERSAL IMPROVEMENT

Aims to support improvement needs and reform-readiness across the whole SEND system.

Key activities include promoting effective inclusive practice across London, developing SEND guidance and benchmarking for Case Officers, improving understanding of reciprocal arrangements and Early Years support, expanding the London SEND Leadership Programme, delivering a pan-London Educational Psychology agency pledge, running the SEND Big Conversation, and enhancing joint training with health colleagues.

This is an exciting opportunity to highlight best practice and help shape inclusion across London through supported funding.

The aim of this funding round is to enable both Local Authorities and educational settings to share their experiences of delivering positive outcomes for young people with SEND across the region, demonstrating impact and endeavour to share their experience in expertise.

There are two Inclusion strands, both designed to prepare London for upcoming larger-scale reforms, while staying flexible enough to adapt to emerging enablers and policy priorities set by the Department.

Who is eligible for the funding?

Schools and Local Authorities are invited to submit nominations

Up to 15 schools can receive £2000. 5 local authorities can receive £25,000.

What is expected from the funding?

Schools selected will be expected to:

- Demonstrate and share strong, impactful inclusive practice
- Showcase their approaches through an online publication
- Participate in school-based events to support wider learning and collaboration

Key Dates & Requirements

All funded activity must:

- Start no earlier than Monday, 3 November 2025
- Be completed by Friday, 17 April 2026

Application deadlines:

 Monday 22nd September -Friday, 17th October 2025

Each local authority is encouraged to submit applications for both strands. The application process will launch on Monday 22nd September 2025. <u>Full details are available here.</u>

Can receive up to a maximum of £2,000 per school for 15 schools.

Each local authority is invited to nominate **one** school and **three** will be selected from each of the five London sub-regions.



Five in total, one per sub-region.

PROGRAMME UPDATES SEND COMMISSIONING



Mime, in partnership with LIIA, has developed the London Specialist Provider Identification

Tool – a one-stop resource combining key datasets on specialist state and independent provision across London. The tool brings together information on capacity, need specialisms, outcomes, workforce and finance to support more effective commissioning.

Online training sessions are available for SEND Commissioners, placement teams and others involved in SEND commissioning. The sessions will cover how to access and use the tool, filter for specific requirements, understand the data included, and provide feedback to inform future updates.

SEND WORKFORCE

Together with the National Association of Principal Educational Psychologists (NAPEP), the Association of London Directors of Children's Services (ALDCS) we have developed a London Pledge for Educational Psychologists (LPEP). The agreement outlines three shared principles - pay rate, PQE and remote working - designed to address challenges in the recruitment and retention of EPs, with a focus on embedding consistent recruitment practices in the supply and quality of agency workers using evidenced protocols adapted from the Child & Family Social Worker London Pledge and subsequent DfE Statutory Guidance for Child & Family Social Workers.

The LPEP recognises the need for Local Authorities to respond collectively and in cooperation and seeks to provide clear protocols and mechanisms of control, whilst also ensuring Local Authorities can respond to their own needs in times of significant pressure locally. We have been grateful for direct input and support from the Association of Educational Psychologists (AEP) alongside a wide range of regional and national networks, and we continue to work collaboratively with other regions who are moving forward on parallel activities on the same three principles. The final agreement will be circulated in coming weeks.

This work forms part of a wider SEND Workforce Programme that in parallel involved better understanding and benchmarking the permanent offer for EPs across London alongside hearing from the workforce directly.
