## MOPAC - REDUCING THE CRIMINALISATION OF CHILDREN IN CARE AND CARE LEAVERS PROTOCOL

This revised protocol is a significant landmark for London with the new agreement offering much greater provision for care leavers.

The protocol secures the commitment of partners to make change and improvement in several areas, including identification and information sharing, increased prevention and diversion, and better support of care leavers within the criminal justice system. Whilst the protocol establishes the overarching commitment of partners, further work is required on the detail of change.

Work to develop this detail has started immediately. We are very grateful to Deputy Keith Bottomley, Sheriff of the City of London, for hosting a group of partners and young people at the Old Bailey to begin the process of bringing the protocol commitments to life. 
